

#### From The Church

#### Praying - Your kingdom come, here and now!

## Not sure how to pray – start with those three words – Your kingdom come...

When Jesus taught his disciples how to pray, the words he used in each account of what we now call The Lord's prayer included: 'Your kingdom come'. When he was first appointed, our Bishop Stephen, encouraged us to pray afresh 'Your kingdom come, here and now. But, what does that mean for us, as individuals and as a community.

The disciples recognised that Jesus' day-to-day actions flowed from his intimate prayer life with God and they wanted their lives to reflect the same. One factor in Jesus' teaching on prayer involves us understanding that God's kingdom has not yet been completely fulfilled on this earth. 'Your kingdom come' is not just a yearning for the coming of Christ in the future, it is a longing to see God's kingdom become increasingly established throughout the world, here and now.

## Your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. (Matthew 6 verse 10)

Your kingdom come means asking our heavenly Father to help us be authentic and effective as Christians. That way we spread God's kingdom not only with words but also through our actions and the qualities of our character.

Praying, "Your kingdom come," is the same as saying, "Dear Lord, please open my heart and the hearts of my loved ones, friends, co-workers, and neighbours to receive Your gift of salvation in Jesus Christ."

Another way we seek the establishment of God's kingdom in the here and now is to pray for aspects of God's nature to be revealed and known in the world. So overwhelming was Isaiah's experience of this, that he saw the glory of God's holiness filling the whole earth:

## "Holy, holy, holy is the LORD Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory" (Isaiah 6 verse 3).

When we pray, "Your kingdom come," we ask God to shine His light into the world so that others may respond to Him with awe and reverence. Jesus is the light of the world who breaks through the darkness of all that is bad in this world by His work on the cross. As believer's we too can become lights to the world playing our small part in the coming of God's kingdom, here and now, right where we are.


#### Nature's Voice

Writing this in January, it has so far been pretty bright and crisp – the kind of winter days that make you feel like spring can't be too far away! It's a little colder than December, but you can't help feel that the properly cold bit is yet to come, and this sunshine is just a trick!



The Winterborne is in full flow – a torrent, thundering along, level with the old bridge on one of my regular dog walks. When we first moved here, we didn't know about the Winterborne... We were told about it by a friend who said 'soon there'll be another river to play in that's only 3 minutes walk away!' A magic river! It's fascinated me ever since. A riverbed that is dry and stony and completely barren one day, that overnight and as if by magic, fills with icy cold, crystal-clear water the next! Not only that, but it fills with life almost as quickly. If you weren't used to it, you'd think it was something out of Game of Thrones or Lord of the Rings.

But as well as sounding a bit mythical, these rivers are really unique. There are 2 Winterborne rivers in Dorset. The one that joins the Stour at Sturminster Marshall is the North Winterborne and the one that joins the River Frome is the South. Drying out and then filling each year provides a habitat unlike anywhere else. When flowing, it welcomes the big celebrities of river life – huge, glittering and pointy-jawed pike lurking in the shadows, and kingfishers zooming downstream.



I've even heard of people seeing otters there in the early morning. But the Winterborne's special habit leads to it being home to other things, even when the water has gone. You might imagine the little fish left stranded in puddles as the summer begins is a terrible thing - save them! But in reality, these fishies provide food for others and nurture the soil of the riverbed. ready for the next year's plant growth. The reduction in fish, who are predators, can also help give other species a chance to build their numbers. The stones provide damp homes for toads who love to wee on you (the surprisingly freezing wee of a cold-blooded creature!) if you pick them up - and presumablyother amphibians and insects spend the dry months there too.

There must be more to learn about this... what happens to the thousands of caddisfly larvae and the ramshorn snails when the stream dries up? What happens to the vegetation in between times and how does it know to spring up again? But I can't find out much. I'm hoping someone reading this might point me in the right direction!

It might be easy, in the winter, to feel frustrated by our rivers, to grumble about having to go 'the long way' to Wimborne because one end of the village is flooded... to have our dog walk options cut down to 1 or 2 viable routes... but they were here first! We, along with humans ever since neolithic times, have chosen to live here in our watery villages. It is part of rural life that our days are shaped by our rivers and we have to listen to nature and adapt our plans for her, and in today's fast-paced and convenient life, it is quite a reminder of her power.







#### **Kingston Lacy Estate News**



The snowdrops are putting on their annual and joyful show at Kingston Lacy, and there are a variety of snowdroprelated events to make the most of the season: early morning walks with one of our expert

guides, a Smartphone workshop to help you make the most of your phone camera, and craft activities that include a Kokedama workshop for adults and a pixie pendent workshop for younger visitors. Check the website for details.

It's not just snowdrops that are waking up; the garden has plenty to interest in winter, with camellias bursting into fabulous bloom, and other wintry plants such as witch-hazel and winter box showing now.

Up at Bishops Court Farm at Shapwick you might see contractors have been busy erecting fencing, to protect tree saplings that will be planted in February from deer and rabbits. It's all part of the Countryside Stewardship scheme that we entered last year; over time this land will become wood pasture, and be grazed by livestock such as our herd of Red Ruby Devons. You'll also see more geophys work, to ensure we know exactly what archaeological information might lie hidden beneath the surface, and can protect it. In the coming year look out for more wildlife boxes and the creation of ponds to help the wildlife that calls this place home.

And finally: whisper it, but we are already thinking about Easter here at Kingston Lacy – it is early this year (Good Friday is 29 March) so the teams went straight from Christmas into Easter without much of a gap! #### **Rules of Grammar**

"The rules of grammar have no value except as statements of fact: whatever is in general use in a language, is for that reason grammatically correct."

Most of today's teachers and students of English agree with Sweet that so-called rules of grammar are only stylistic preferences.

No one in Britain lays down the law about grammar.

In France, several organisations and a government minister have attempted, without much success, to pass laws for the perfection and preservation of the French language. Their language, like ours, develops without regard to rigid rules, through the usage made by the people who speak and write it in many forms, each being appropriate to the context in which it is used.

#### DORSET COUNCILLORS COLUMN

2024 will be a year of elections – May  $2^{nd}$  sees those for local government, including Dorset Council, local town and parish councils, and for the post of Police and Crime Commissioner. Then there is the general election, date yet to be confirmed. My personal view is that to hold a general election on May  $2^{nd}$  would confuse the electorate with four different ballot papers and probably a big turn off for many folk.

Local government, particularly town and parish councils, faces increasing difficulty in attracting candidates wishing to become local councillors, and in order to operate within the law many co-opt members to make the numbers up. Whilst a means to an end this is not an ideal way for a balance of representation on those councils that do. In my experience I believe that residents prefer to have elected representatives to deal with a range of local issues and work with the upper tier authority, plus there is less risk of an individual pursuing single issue matters, often those affecting them personally, as indeed I have witnessed with some co-optees.

Have you ever thought of becoming a local parish councillor? As a councillor you will play a vital role in dealing with local issues.

Councillors do not need any special or formal qualifications.

It is important that they not only represent the communities that they serve, but also have a wide range of backgrounds, skills, and experience. The knowledge and experience they have gained through their personal and professional life are important skills to bring to the councillor role.

There are opportunities for learning and development. This includes key pieces of knowledge that councillors will need including information on how services work, understanding the council's budget and legal considerations that the council has to comply with. Training is offered through the Dorset Association of Parish & Town Councils (DAPTC).

The way in which councillors conduct themselves in office, particularly over matters where they have a financial interest, is governed both by the law and by a code of conduct. Councillors have to sign a declaration stating they will observe the council's code of conduct. They have to declare certain financial and other interests which they may have and can't take part in decisions if they have any related financial interests. Becoming a councillor will require a time commitment to address residents' concerns, reply to communications and to attend parish/town meetings. Other responsibilities include

- attendance at other local meetings
- reading committee agendas and documents before the meeting
- engaging with learning and development opportunities
- meeting with Dorset Council officers and ward Councillors

I hope the above will encourage some of you to put yourselves forward, if so nomination forms and information will be online from mid-February or contact your local parish clerk for further information.

February comes from the Latin word *februa*, which means "to cleanse." The month was named after the Roman *Februalia*, which was a monthlong festival of purification and atonement that took place this time of year. Spring Cleaning!

February 1st was the Celtic Feast of Imbolc. Imbolc means "in milk" and it was traditionally the start of the lactation period of cows and sheep as they fed their young. During this time it was customary to pour some milk onto the earth.

Candlemas is a Christian festival celebrated on February 2nd, commemorating the Virgin Mary who, in obedience to Jewish law, went to the Temple in Jerusalem both to be purified 40 days after the birth of her son, Jesus, and to present him to God as her firstborn. As the rhyme goes: If Candlemas Day be fair and bright, Winter will have another flight. But if it be dark with clouds and rain, Winter is gone and will not come again.

Pancake day, falls on 13th February and Valentine's day on the 14th, which this year is also Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent, but have you heard of the Feast of St Blaize? He is the patron saint of people afflicted with sore throats! There is a ceremony held in St Etheldreda's church in London each year when people with throat complaints are blessed by being touched with two candles bound together.

#### STURMINSTER MARSHALL PARISH JOTTINGS

It is very cold today as I write this months jottings, and this weather is going to continue for a quite a few days yet, however it is a relief from all the rain and flooding we have been experiencing. I don't think we have seen flooding quite this bad since the winter of 2012/13.

As you will have been aware, SGN have been digging up the A350 to try and sort out a leak. The outcome of this leak is that the gas pipe needs to be replaced. We have had regular meetings and SGN have provided updates for us to pass on to you. I am hopeful that this work will be completed within this month.

The new noticeboard at Maypole Green has been installled, and the defibrillator for Mapperton and Almer has been delivered and is in place, and active. Trees to commemorate the Coronation last May have been planted in and around the Play Area. Please keep them safe and if you see anyone damaging them please report this to the Parish Clerk. On a not so good note, we are seeing Fly Posting on telegraph poles and other places, this is illegal and can carry a fine. Please use the Public Noticeboards.

The Neighbourhood Plan has been submitted and meets the requirements of Regulation 15. The consultation period started on the 19<sup>th</sup> January 2024 and will run until 1<sup>st</sup> March 2024. The draft plan and comments received to the consultation will be considered by an independent examiner. A poster with details on how to access the Plan and make a response is on the Parish Web site and our Noticeboards. I know we are not quite there yet, but I would like to take this opportunity to offer an enormous thank you to the Steering Committee that have work so hard and given up so much of their time to get the Plan to this point, the Parish owes them a big debt of gratitude.

Dorset Council Planners have brought in the requirement from the 15<sup>th</sup> January 2024 to submit a sustainability statement and checklist for certain planning applications. Further information can be found on the Dorset Council website.

This year the Parish Council precept will increase by 5.42%. This is an increase (for an average Band D property) of £3.72 per year or 0.31p per month. The reasons for the increase are an increase in core expenditure costs to meet with inflation including Clerk's Salary, insurance, audit, and phone. Increases in administration costs including legal and professional fees and website costs, including a new accountancy package. Increase in parish grass cutting costs. A small budget increase to repair and maintenance for gardening projects.

#### Plant a Tree with Trees for Wimborne

When I read an article in the Dorset Wildlife Trusts magazine, on the plight of Woodlands in Dorset I was reminded that trees and the Woodlands that they create are both fragile and in difficulty. This has many causes, ash dieback, climate change bringing with it flooding and drought as well as fragmentation of the habitat. Dorset Wildlife Trusts has plans to address this which include delivering projects over large areas to link woodland and creating new Woodlands.

Trees for Wimborne, the tree planting arm of Wilding Wimborne, is not in a position to be so ambitious, but we are in a position to add new planting to the Wimborne landscape. We have now entered into our second tree planting season; we were spurred on by the support shown by the public and with the hedge at Dogdean SANG, now doing well we decided to undertake another round of planting. This time we planned with the local authority to create 3 woodland corners or edges. Trees for Wimborne have spent the summer organising what

trees to plant and where. We chose species that are not already present on the green space. This will add diversity. providing a wider range of food plants for insects, a rich source of nectar for pollinators and various types of habitats for birds. One of the species that we have planted are small leaved limes: these



used to be a dominant tree across the South of England but may have been one of the first trees to be cleared to provide agricultural land; unsurprisingly they have now become very rare. Their flowers have a heavy scent and are a magnet for bees; they make wonderful tasting honey. We have also planted hornbeam, wild cherry, and alder buckthorn. The latter is the food plant for the brimstone butterfly; in years to come this should mean that residents and visitors will see these lovely yellow butterflies fluttering along the tree line as early as January on a sunny day.

The trees are now all planted allowing time for young trees to settle down and begin to develop roots. we hope that in addition to their biodiversity value that in times to come these trees will bring pleasure to all those who walk on Dogdean, adding beauty to the landscape and acting as shelter belts across what can be a windswept site.



We're very excited that we have a new planting area, this is next to a bridleway which runs parallel to the newly constructed Ainsley Road. On one side of the bridleway is a lovely hedge with a range of different species, but on the other side the hedge has deteriorated and become sparse and even disappeared in places. This is partly due to the dead elm in the hedge which Dorset council have been removing. We will be underplanting the areas where there are existing trees, and creating a new hedgerow where there are gaps. This is a big job, and we need to plant 300

metres of hedge, so we are very much hoping that the public, especially those who live close to Ainsley Road will come along and help us on our planting days on the  $4^{th}$  and  $18^{th}$  February.

We will be planting with a range of species to make this hedge diverse and colourful so that it is attractive to a range of insect species, particularly to pollinators. We will be adding several European walnut trees as well as flowering trees such as wild cherry, wild plum, wild pear, and cherry plum. We will also be planting trees that give a bounty in the autumn such as Hazel and Rowan.

If you can come and help us plant, please bring a spade and come dressed warmly. We will be starting tree planting at Ainsley Road, on the new estate off Leigh Road. Look out for the gazebo where we will be gathering.

#### Not Any More..... by Lys de Bray

Like many gardeners, for years I kept opened bags of peat in my greenhouse and potting sheds, the tops carefully sealed with clothes-pegs. Never, never leave compost bags open, if you do, opportunistic pests will say 'Thanks ever so!' and lay a million tiny invisible eggs which will hatch in this cosy protected environment into tiny but visible pests that do a great deal of damage. But this won't be happening any more as the government has banned peat in bagged compost and obviously the ban will apply to peat pots which I used by the hundred, and though needing care in handling they were perfect for transplanting seedling plants, pot and all into the next size up, quick and easy and avoiding root disturbance. Years ago, I used to spread peat over the soil surface of my rose beds, and as there's no nourishment in peat there were fewer weeds and it did look nice. But, years ago I knew no better and now I do. In former times gardeners and nurserymen made their own compost from sieved loam (garden soil) sieved peat, sieved leafmould, horticultural grit or sand and their own secret fertiliser that they never disclosed. I had three bins side by side made from roughly made shipping crates. One was for new green stuff with stems and stalks chopped small, the middle one was quietly getting on with things and the last one was ready to use. The resulting compost smelled lovely and it was so good that it looked positively edible, though it took time like an Englishman in one of Earth Kitt's memorable ballads.

But, as usual, I've digressed.

The reason for the peat ban is because of our concern over the damage that peat extraction does to the environment. Peat has taken thousands of years to form into the dark, crumbly stuff we get from the garden centres and we don't - or didn't - give this fact much thought as we gaily put a bag - or two - into the boot of the car. But - once it's gone, it's gone.

So from now on we shall have to grow things differently in a peat-less gardening world. Peat is light in weight and the new mixes will inevitably be heavier and they will need new and different treatment.

The government has listened to advice and the general no-peat deadline is 2026.

Growing plants in a peat-less compost will mean that gardeners will have to learn new ways of feeding and watering because you won't be able to sow and grow as formerly.
